This has been a year of big changes for Kandelia. We kicked off the year with a staff retreat in the summer of 2024. We brought our team together to come to consensus on how we would adjust our programs to meet the community needs we identified throughout the spring in our listening circles. This led to some difficult decisions, and also some exciting new programs.

Based on Kandelia's unique strengths, and the needs we heard from our immigrant and refugee students and families, we decided to center our programs around three core pillars:

- · language access
- · educational resources
- · employment & career opportunities

For needs outside of these areas, we decided to make referrals to vetted partners with a warm handoff. We believe that the combination of strong direct service in a few key program areas and a robust network of partner organizations will enable Kandelia to make the greatest impact for our students and families. Details on how these changes have been rolled out across our Youth, Family, and Community Engagement programs are included in the following sections.

These changes were already underway before the seismic shift in political climate that is impacting Kandelia and every other group working with immigrant and refugee communities. Families that thought they'd reached the end of a long journey, who came to the U.S. seeking safety and a better life for themselves and their children, are now facing fear and uncertainty.

Our team has rallied. We've all had a crash course on immigration policy, and are working to stay up to date on ongoing changes. We hosted an immigrant rights workshop, distributed Know Your Rights cards in multiple languages, and organized consultations with immigration attorneys so families could understand their options.

We know that being a welcoming city for newcomers is not just the right thing to do - it also makes Seattle's economy stronger and our community healthier and more vibrant. We are deeply grateful for our many partner organizations, donors, and volunteers who continue to share time, resources, and expertise to help support and protect our immigrant and refugee neighbors.

Kandelia's Programs

Kandelia wants immigrant and refugee youth to have equitable access and choice for educational and career opportunities. We serve youth directly, strengthen their local family support network, and work to improve the systems that impact their lives. Our programs fall into three main categories:

- Youth Programs
- Family Programs
- Community Engagement


All of our programs are culturally responsive, integrate language support, center relationships, and acknowledge and build on participants' strengths. In total, our programs impact over 600 individuals each year.

Kandelia's Youth Programs operate out of Seattle World School (SWS), a unique school designed specifically to support the needs of recently arrived immigrant and refugee students. Classes include Summer School, Student Success Coaching, various English classes, and Job Readiness Training that includes career exploration opportunities.

Kandelia's Family Programs are mostly online, and are open to caregivers of immigrant and refugee middle and high school students across Seattle Public Schools. Programs include English and Digital Literacy classes, and workshops for navigating education, parenting, and daily life in the U.S. Workshop topics are developed each year based on input from caregivers.

Since 2019, our Community Engagement Program provided weekly, culturally relevant groceries to families. We have now sunsetted this portion of the program and are focusing on building our network of vetted referral partners for needs Kandelia does not meet through direct service.



YOUTH PROGRAMS

Kandelia's Youth Programs experienced some shifts this year. The 2024-2025 school year was the last year we offered athletics and enrichment activities as part of core programming. Winding down these parts of our work has enabled us to launch our Job Readiness Training classes and offer career exploration opportunities, which help equip students with skills for immediate employment (if that is their goal), and offer options to explore the range of career pathways open to them in Seattle. We've also launched Student Success Coaching, our mentorship program. Informal mentorship has always been part of our work, but this year we formalized the program and experimented with barrier removal funding to help students make progress towards their goals. Through surveys and listening sessions we've learned a lot about what students liked about these new programs and the changes they hope to see. As we begin year two, we're excited to implement these changes and continue building a robust offering of programs to help our students build skills for their future.

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YOUTH PROGRAMS: THE STORIES

Laura was a 12th grade student this past school year. She expressed an interest in auto mechanics and enrolled in classes alongside her studies at SWS. However, she began doubting her ability to succeed because she was the only woman in the class. Gustavo, Kandelia's Youth Program Coordinator, talked with Laura about his own time working in auto mechanics and some of the successful women he worked with in that field. After lending her some of his own workbooks and encouraging her to keep attending her classes, she decided to stick with it. Throughout the year, Laura came to Kandelia's office to tell Gustavo about the



things she had learned, get help with her homework, and share how much she was enjoying the class. A few days before her graduation from SWS, Laura shared an invitation with Gustavo to make sure he would be there. Each student was given the opportunity to say a few words about their high school experience and plans for the future. In her speech, Laura thanked Gustavo for all his support and encouragement, sharing how much it meant to move her towards her goal of becoming an auto mechanic.



YOUTH PROGRAMS - WHAT WE'RE **LEARNING**

- Field Trips are an effective way for our students to learn, engage with class material, and get to know Seattle.
- We continue to see that stipends, food, and relationship building are key factors to success in terms of program engagement.
- Career exploration opportunities are most successful when Kandelia is able to collaborate with host organizations to ensure the needs of our multilingual students are met.
- While the need for mentorship is clear, students need more guidance on the ways Student Success Coaching can support them.
- Older students and those closer to graduation are often the students working more hours, and are often unable to fully participate in our programs. We'll continue working to remove barriers for these students.

FAMILY PROGRAMS

This year Kandelia expanded eligibility for our Family Programs to caregivers of immigrant and refugee middle and high school students across Seattle Public Schools. This opens our services to more caregivers, and helps ensure caregivers of middle school students are aware of Seattle World School as an option as their students enroll in high school. Families from 17 different schools participated in our program this year.

FAMILY PROGRAMS: THE STORIES

Many of the families in our programs face difficult legal circumstances: pending cases with long delays, rapidly changing immigration policies, and a lack of support to understand how changes might impact their family. The current political climate has brought increased fear and uncertainty, and we've received many requests for help with lawyers or reliable information so families could make safe decisions for their loved ones. However, the specialized organizations we initially turned to no longer had the capacity to take on new cases, so we looked for alternatives. Kandelia provided 175 "red cards" to students and families with information about their legal rights in case of interaction with immigration authorities, and organized informational workshops on how to prepare for different immigration situations. We also organized an event at SWS to bring in lawyers who provided free consultations for our families. Thanks to this event, concrete and hopeful progress has been made. One mother was able to start the visa application process for her daughter. Another woman obtained legal representation for her court hearing. A few people were able to begin the process of obtaining their work permits.

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FAMILY PROGRAMS - WHAT WE'RE LEARNING

- So much of the success of our Family Programs is due to the deep relationships and trust built between staff/instructors and program participants.
- These relationships mean we are often the first point of contact when our families need support, including areas in which we're not experts. In response, our Community Engagement Program is developing a network of referral partners, vetted for accessibility and culturally responsive services, that can help meet family needs.
- Families continue to need support in additional languages. While our multilingual team can communicate in the home language of over 70% of our participants, additional support will always be needed. Our instructors have begun using subtitles in languages they don't speak themselves in order to ensure classes are as accessible as possible for all participants.
- We've seen the value in cross cultural learning opportunities for families and their students and hope to provide more in the coming year.





COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Kandelia's Food Access Program was established to meet urgent food needs in 2019 and has grown since. In alignment with Kandelia's strategic plan and core focus areas, we have made the decision to sunset our Food Access Program and in June of this year we held our last food distribution day. Starting this fall, we are shifting the focus of our Community Engagement Program to resource navigation. Resource navigation is often a challenge for newcomers because of language and cultural barriers, and lack of familiarity with local resources. In the current political climate, families can be hesitant to access resources for fear of drawing attention to themselves. In our Community Engagement Program, Kandelia staff will meet with families to identify strengths and barriers to meeting their basic needs. Together, they will create a plan to access resources from vetted partners. A staff member will check in with families regularly until needs have been met or resources are no longer needed.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT: THE STORIES

This past year, former youth program participant, Patrick, reached out to Kandelia about volunteer opportunities. Patrick participated in Kandelia's youth programs in 2014 after moving to Seattle from Kenya. Through Kandelia's programs, Patrick felt a sense of belonging and grew his love for work that gives back. When we reconnected, he was completing his degree in Community Environment and Planning at the University of Washington, with plans to work in urban planning to improve his community. Patrick returned to Kandelia to help with our weekly food bag distribution this winter, giving us the opportunity to reconnect with him. We're fortunate that we get to hear from many of our previous participants each year through volunteering, events, and community connections.





COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT - WHAT WE'RE LEARNING

- · Access to food remains a need within our community, but Kandelia's core focus areas, skillsets, and physical space limitations mean that we are not the best organization to provide this direct service.
- Our Food Access Program has allowed Kandelia to form connections with many families, and begin to learn more about their other needs.
- Families can benefit from case-by-case assistance and support connecting to resources. Kandelia has the relationships and trust needed to make these connections.
